UPDATES ON THE CONVENTION

The LTAHA Convention was held at Dewey Wills WMA on April 22, 2023. We had a great turn out, at one demo alone there was roughly 70 people crowded around eager to watch and learn. This crowd along with the several other combined groups resulting in over 50 memberships/renewals!

The day started with the set up of our vendors including Okie Cable and Trapping Supply and Morace Family farms. As people shopped around, they couldn't help but notice the lovely donated items for the auction and the 35 Whelen to be raffled off from Guns and Barrels.

Also included was several demos from many experienced Trappers. In between events you could find the crowd enjoying some sweet BBQ or purchasing memberships/renewals near check in. There we also had merchandise such as the new shirts and embroidered items.

Next or the agenda was Beaver Skinning contest where we had 4 contestants. The winner received an etched Skinning board. The fun didn't stop there, the president gave out awards including that of Chuck Sturgis who made every single workshop and event in 2022!

The general election was to follow where some new board members were elected. Congrats to Homer Gibson, Sarah Williamson, and returning Justin Ebarb.

The convention ended with the auction, raffle, and board meeting. The following day was designated to an instructor workshop.

This year's NTA meetings were long as always. Most people think of the NTA convention as vendors and demos with the smell of lure. In fact, the whole purpose of the gathering is to handle business for the national association. I will try to cover as much of the business end as possible in short order.

Any concerns or ideas you wish to share with the NTA, please share with me.

The election for NTA president went to John Daniels of TN. John will serve his final 2-year term as NTA President in a new era of the industry. Post COVID, with wildlife management data on our side, great relations with the FTA, and the re-branding of the FBU. John has led the NTA through tough times, dark hours, and still looks to the future with optimism. With John's leadership, I hope these next two years see the trapping industry become a common topic of discussion in much larger circles

The NTA board of directors did vote by ½ + majority to make and send a ballot amendment to the NTA membership for ratification. The amendment will require that any future NTA Presidental candidate have served as an Executive Council member. The reason for the amendment is an attempt to protect the NTA from hostile takeover by any one group including anti-organizations. Listening to the discussion was interesting and I understand the thought process behind the amendment. The other side of the debate is there is already a limited talent pool to draw leadership from and to limit more is not in the association's best interest. Louisiana violes' to allow the membership to vote on the amendment. I believe the Louisiana delegation to the field vest that there may be a better way to achieve the goal of protecting the NTA offices while not limiting ourselves to fewer candidates. Even though we voted to send it to the membership, I feel there are better options and we will know them when we hear them.

I have had a Louisiana NTA member make a suggestion about voter integrity and ballot numbering for the national-level election and ballot votes. I made a full submission of his proposal to the election committee chairman by email. I am not on the committee however it is my job to forward any idea that Louisiana NTA members may have to the proper committee chairman. If you have any concerns or ideas you wish to share with the NTA please let me know.



We also learned that our ability to sell fur to the Europan Union has been re-upped for another ten years through the treaty voted on by the EU. Thankfully Finland voted to allow North American fur to be traded in the EU as a commodity for another ten years without more regulation. This treaty was made possible by the hard work and dedication of many people in the industry, however, the heaviest lifting was done by the use of the Best Management Practices (BMP) which the LTAHA education is based on. So we go back for the next battle in 2033, at which time the world should be using mostly electric cars, windmills at everyone's house, and solar panels on every roof in the world. Believe it or not, if we wait to start lobbying for the market till 2032, we will lose the battle.

The NIA national headquarters is really taking shape and looks good. The money budgeted for the construction and remodel is working out well. While at the NTA auction, the building fund raised twenty-five hundred dollars on an otter stretcher plaque to be placed in the NTA HQ with donor name tags on the boards. The building has undergone many renovations and has a new roof and front sentence.

The optimism shared by the newer generation of trappers entering the industry for management and personal goals has the trapping industry standing on the edge of success as I have never seen before in the industry. I like to think of our organization as half full optimist instead of the old defeated half empty group. We are looking forward to tomorrow's advancements like an opening morning trap check. The only thing that stands in our way right now is our own inability to accept success. Lend a hand and help grow the trapping industry. Be stewards of good relations between other groups and organizations who will rely on our knowledge and leadership to better their sports and industries.
